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

THE POPE FAVORS FRANCE It Is Expected He Will Try to Defeat the

German Army Bill. Ronn, Oct. 5.-The Pope yesterday gave an audience to Herr von Bulow, sold this land for £400 a league, making a new Prussian Minister to the Vatican, who was recently appointed to succeed Herr Schloezer. After the formal audience His Holiness had a private onversation with the Minister. They were ploseted together for two hours.
