A BUTCHERY IN GLASGOW

WOMAN MURDERED AND HER BODY MUTILATED

The Suspecial Murderer Is a Gardener and His Room, Where the Deed War Done, Had the Appearance of shambles-The Victim Unknown and the Murderer a Fugitive.

GLASGOW, Oct. 12 .- The most horrible marder in the criminal history of this city. was committed Monday at West Lodge, a villa on the Albert-road, in Poliokshields, on the outskirts of Glasgow. A woman, gut worse. Then we still unidentified, was motilated after the method of "Jack the Ripper," was dismembered, and the pieces of her body were buried in the villa garden. McEwan, the gardener, who, doubtless, is guilty of the

Mc Ewan, with the assistant gardener, Mc Dougall, lived in a separate house, and when neighborhood. At 6 o'clock Tuesday morning McDoogs knocked at McEwan's door to wake him. he has done for the last six years. McEwaresponded with unusual promptitude. " All right, Tom. I won't get up yet.

Red finge marks streaked the side of one of the hed and the door. There was not a piece of

furniture or an article of clothing which was not blood stained. McDougall ran coatless and hatless and rying in his terror to the police station

and told his story. In a similar bed they uncovered the trunk. It was absolutely devoid of all, internal organs. Beside the trunk was the woman's left arm, also unjointed. In another flower bed they found the missing organs and the legs, unjointed as were the arms. The trail led from this last bed to a tool house. Turk under a pile of rubbish and tools, was a biscuit box containing a fragment of a large saw, the teeth still dotted with flesh and blood and several smaller pieces of the weman's body. The police say that the box was used by McEwan in trans-

porting the limbs and the organs from his room to the garden. A search of McEwan's room se vealed several resors, apparently un used for some time and an ax, recently washed, but still showing slight blood stains. McDougall was unable to give any information as to McEwan or the disposition of the body, for he was working at the time on the opposite side of the house, as was shown by the fresh-turned earth. He believes that when he knocked

at 6 o'clock that McEwan was carving up the body, as McEwan's voice indicated that he was wide awake. So far as can be judged from the remains of the body, McEwan's victim was robust, of medium height, about 30 or 35 years old. Her clothing was well made and of good material. McEwan probably took her to the house after 6 o'clock, for at that time McDougall called upon him and found him alone. This is the last time Mc-Swan was seen by anybody near West Lodge. How and when McEwan induced the woman to enter the house and what

was his motive in the murder are mys-It was reported immediately after the news of the murder got out that McEwan was "Jack the Ripper," and at the time of the "Ripper" murders he was absent from Glasgow, but these reports are discredited. McEwan was engaged to marry a respectable girl, who is maid in a Glasgow family. The mother when she heard of the murder supposed that her daughter was the victim and ran to West Lodge. She could not identify the clothing as her daughter's, however, and this evening the girl was

The police say that McEwan had little money and will soon be captured. The woman's body has been put together as well as possible, and now lies at the morgue waiting identification.

MURDER OF THE LUCKYS

LITTLE DOUBT THAT THE PRISONER IS GUILTY.

50 Far All-the Evidence Against Him wicted Through the Mency Found in His Possession When Arrested-Great Excitement Over the Crime.

SMITH'S FALLS, Out., Oct. 12 .- The whole country around here is in a terrible atate of excitement over the Lucky tragedy, and crowds of people still continue to visit the ruins of the house and linger over them with a morbid desire to glean something in the way of particulars even more horrible than they are already in possession of. The theory of a double murder and suicide is not accepted by many, and while a great many different stories are being circulated as to the manner in which the parties me their cruel death there is no doubt but that the man now confined in Smith's Falls jail is the guilty party, the slayer of his father, stepmother and sister. A newspaper correspondent drove to th

scene of the affair and interviewed a number of farmers regarding the murder and suicide theory, and from information received it is plain that the prisoner had a standing grudge against the ather; that he came down from Toronto on Friday night and walked out to Newbliss, that he hid in the woods until a convenient time arrived and then atole in upon the unsuspecting relatives and killed them, afterwards setting fire to the house to cover his diabelical crime. He is supposed then to have hidden in the woods mtil nightfall, as he was met on the Smith's Fails road about 8 o'clock by Farmer Poquet, as stated in yesterday's despatches. That the prisoner was at loggerheads with his father is wellknown; and being of a surfy, revengeful disposition, he no doubt brooded over his wrongs while in confinement, and being released immediately proceeded to put his vicious thoughts into action. He is a strong, sturdy man and it would be no task for him to make away

with his parents and sister. It is supposed that he watched the father leave the house in the morning and later the ais er. He then entered the house and slew his stepmother and waited for the return of his sister, who was visiting a few rods from the fated boose. On her return he would be able to despatch her with ease, and her teeth being found in the yard maker this theory probable. Lastly the aged father met the same fate, and fastening the doors and windows the inhuman monster set fire to the house and secreted himself in the woods until night time. Had the neighbors searched the woods immediately on discovering the fire they undoubtedly

would have found him. The inquest, which is called for to-mor row morning, will be filled with interest, The prisoner will be taken from the jair here to the scene of the inquest and afterwards transferred to Brockville Jail if committed, Chief McGowan is working away on the case vigorously and expects to have some startling information to unfold at the inquest. Detective Greer of Toronto arrived last night and is assisting him on the case. The pair left for the scene of the tragedy this morning to collect evi-

dence and have not yet returned. It is reported that one Devlin, a cattle buyer of Ottawa, is ready to swear to the identity of a certain \$5 bill which he gave to the old man Lucky in payment of some stock, and the money found in the prisoner's pocket will be submitted to him for inspection. This will be an important clue. As it is the finding of a large sum of money on his person is sufficient evidence that he was in the house, because the father was reported to be worth a few hundred dollars, and it is not likely the prisoner would have any money on his person when he left the jail with no more than would pay his fare to Smith's Falls. The young man has made no effort as yet to secure counsel. He, of course, will have a very fair show, as if be is convicted at all it will be merely on circumstantial evidence.
