

> into two sections, one extending into the Argentine Republic to Mendoza, 650 miles. west of Buenos Ayres, and at an elevation of 2,411 feet above the sea, and the Chilian section, which extends to Santa Rosa, eighty-one miles from Valparaiso, and at about the same elevation as Mendora. The total distance by rail from Buenes Ayres to Valparaiso is about 881 miles, of which 700 miles are in Argentine territory and 121 in the Chillan. The road in the Argentine territory now extends as far as Punta de lies Vacus, ninety miles from Mendoza, and it is expected that this section of road will be completed within the present year. During the last season fifty-eight miles of the Argentine section from Mendoza to Uspailata were open to public traffic, and many travelers availed themselves of this overland route in preference to the long sea voyage via the Straits of Magellan. After the road has been in operation for a year or two, when both sections will have reached the foot of the pass, the journey can be accomplished in about fifty-four hours and at a cost of sixty dollars, being less than one-third of the cost of the sea voyage and a gain of ten days in travel.
