QUEEN'S VS. OSGOODS HALL

Queen's Men were Defeated in Toronto on
Saturday.

Although the match, between the second
fifteen and all Queen's college
could hardly be called a very severe ex-
position of Rugby (football), it was certainly
one of the most exciting games of the season.

At the end of this first half the game stood
6 to 1 in favor of Queen's, and after thirty
minutes in the second half Queen's had
added nine to their score, while Osgood's
had made but one more, so that Osgood's
was 17 points to 1.

readings which will be open to ladies.


