Reminiscent Corner. The WHIGS first battles were fought against the competition of convict labor with home merchanics and for the incorporation of Kingston. The latter movement had opponents as well as supporters in plenty, but in 1838, while the people were absorbed in the rebellion agitation, the charter was alipped through the legislature stealthily and became law before the public knew what the features of the measure were. The town was divided into four wards, with an alderman and councillor for each, these to select the mayor for the city at large.
