## GAMBLING.

SAYS CHAMBERLAIN.

It Would Be Silly for Britain to Abandon Uganda.

London, Oct. 27.—Mr. Chamberlain has written a long letter to the Anti-Slavery Association denouncing the abominations in Uganda by the British Government. He says that it would be cowardly and silly for Great Britain to abandon Uganda to barbarism or to allow another European nation to seize that country. A small expeditionary force would avert that undesirable result, and would at the same time strike a blow at the Arab slave dealers.

## FROM ACROSS THE SEA.

## SIR JOHN LUBBOCK ON TRADE MATTERS

Canadian Castle Said to Be Attacked by French—Fomented at Dundee—British Express Another British—Lord Salisbury and a Peasant of Sweats.

LONDON, Oct. 27.—At a meeting of London Chamber of Commerce yesterday the Right Hon. Sir John Lubbock, president of the chamber, occupied the chair. Sir John delivered an address in which he urged upon the unsatisfactory state of trade, and how little had not been effected by the Minto Tariff up to the extent that was expected. British trade with America, he said, had declined less than it had with other countries. The greatest sufferers were the Americans, who in their turn acted similarly to the British. Canadian products, added, were in a condition of commercial paralysis that could not be indefinitely prolonged. The McKinley Bill constituted a great opportunity for Canada. The bill in places, however, was a disadvantage, if Canada profited by it, and lowered her import duties, her merchants would be benefited, because many British products required in the west market could find their way through the heavy customs dues. Sir John declared that bi-metallism would never be adopted by Great Britain, as it would be imposed by a ratio of value.

*Controversy and Disputation.*

MANCHESTER, Oct. 27.—In compliance with a petition adopted by a meeting of the leading merchants of Manchester the mayor has convened a meeting of citizens to draw up a memorial urging the Government to re-investigate the international agreement in regard to iron. The petition, in drafting upon the unsatisfactory state of trade, says that business with the Orient and with Mexico has been seriously affected, and the difficulty is increasing owing to the fluctuations in exchange in silver and gold.

*Another Exposure by Truth.*

LONDON, Oct. 27.—Truth yesterday identified a man, Wells, a famous and impudent monger in London, with the Wells who recently gained notoriety through his alleged winnings at Monte Carlo. Truth says: Understated by previous exposures of Truth, Wells has been on a larger scale than before. Within a few days, under the pretence that he was about to sue patients that would yield enormous wealth to investors, Wells has victimized, out of £18,000, another lady out of £3,000, and a gentleman out of £10,000, in smaller fees, ranging from £100 with a few years' savings to invest, to amounts commanding thousands of pounds. All sections of society have been victimized. Wells might have long since retired with an enormous fortune, but he is an inveterate gambler.

*Wales Will Visit Chicago.*

*To BOMBARD DOVER.*

A French Melinite Gun Which Will Carry Six Miles Across the Channel.

LONDON, Oct. 27.—The Morning Advertiser of Liverpool announces that he is able to state upon unimpeachable authority that the English War Office has in its possession accurate designs of a new French melinite gun of terrific power, which French gun can easily sink a ship of 1,000 tons. *A Recession That Is Unatisfactory.*

LONDON, Oct. 27.—M. Louhet, President of the Chamber of Deputies, to whom the Carmaux labor troubles were referred for arbitration, decides that Calvignac, mayor of Carmaux, whose discharge by the mining company was the cause of all the trouble, shall be taken back into the service in the employ, but that leave of absence should be granted to him throughout the term of his mayoralty. He also decides that the company shall reinstate all the striking miners except those who were convicted of rioting. The recession is unsatisfactory and will be discussed by the Chamber of Deputies tomorrow.

The Carnoux Mining Co. has accepted Premier Louhet's decision. The striking miners are disappointed at Premier Louhet's decision, mainly because all the rioters are not reinstated. At a special meeting held this evening it was decided to reject the award and to continue the strike. The action of the leaders in connection with the nominal vote by which the men's views were rejected is considered a most audacious act of intimidation. The police and military officials are continuing to make arrangements for decisive action in the event of disorder arising.

*Mr. Blake at Boston.*

BOSTON, Oct. 27.—By invitation, Hon. Edward Blake delivered an address on the Irish question last night in Tremont Temple. Hon. P. A. Collins called the meeting to order. Mayor Matthews presided.

*NEILL IN KENT.*

The London Postman Lived for a Time at Chatham.

CHATHAM, Oct. 27.—It has been learned that Dr. Neill, who was born in Chatham, has been given a pension of £100 only by a trifling majority. The electors are almost certain to follow the precedent set since 1847, and have reserved their decision for the next appeal to the country. The constant expectation of such a reversal implies a continued struggle nearly silent of civil war.

*The Chronicle on the Article.*

The Chronicle, referring to Lord Salisbury's article, says this is a great political event, not on account of the weight of Lord Salisbury's arguments, but because it indicates that the gravest national issues are destined to be fought to the bitter end, instead of settling amicably and patriotically on national grounds.

*Canadian Cattle Attacked.*

London, Oct. 27.—Pneumonia has been discovered in Canadian cattle landed at Dundee.

*THE POLITICAL PRISONERS.*

Their Release to be Considered by the British Cabinet.

LONDON, Oct. 27.—At the Cabinet meeting to-day John Morley, Chief Secretary for Ireland, will present proposals for the release of all the political prisoners in Ireland.

The ministerial decision on these proposals will involve the question of granting amnesty to all the men convicted of taking part in the dynamite outrages of a few years ago. The principal prisoners serving sentence under conviction of these charges are confined to English prisons.

The Conservative party, in its effort to obtain the release of the Fenians, Muller and Downing and the dynamiter, J. F. Egan, who have served two-thirds of the time to which they were sentenced. Even Mr. Parnell, who was once Secretary, admits that amnesty might easily be extended to them. But the Government will not dare to face the consequences that would follow the release of Dr. Gallagher and the others concerned in causing the explosions in London. The Telegraph defines the plan to degrade the prerogative of mercy by releasing a number of men who took part in these outrages.

*Show in Switzerland.*

LONDON, Oct. 27.—A despatch from The Standard from Lausanne says that snow has fallen abundantly in Switzerland and has stopped traffic on the Funicular Rail at Rigirosa where the employees are blockaded.

*Choirs at Vienna.*

VIENNA, Oct. 27.—Six new cases and four death from cholera were reported by the authorities of this city to-day.
