It is nine inches n diameter where it is largest. If the nsks of half a dozen elephants such as travel around the country with shows were put together they would not make the equal of the great specimen which is ipped to the paleantologist at Washing ton university. This animal of the great tooth and greater tusks walked on four egs, and ponderous underpinning it was. he ball on which the hind legs moved in the hip socket is as large as the body of a man. The length of the thighbone can only be proved by proportions. The bail and part of the thighbone have been found, but where the bone tapers midway between thigh and knee there is a break. Better preserved is the upper bone of the oreleg. The first of the joints of the backoone, that on which the head rolled, has rertebra-that from which the tail extendd.
