

The action of Henry vs. Dunbar excited considerable interest and was tried at the Napanee assizes, on Monday last, before Hon. Chief Justice Armour. His lordship laid down the law that the travelling public had the right to the whole of the highway, and not merely to a portion of it, and that, further, no person has a right to

place a threshing machine or any other object on his own place adjoining the highway, which will frighten horses and cause them to shy. The learned judge also, in answer to the defendant's defence that the horse was liable to kick and shy, said that was no answer, that a farmer had a perfect right to own a horse that will shy and kick, that he is not obliged to put such a horse

A SWINDLER CAUGHT.

He Made Much Money By The Use Of Bogus Drafts. NEW YORK, Nov. 2 .- Charles A. Howes, aged twenty-eight, a civil engineer, who for eighteen months past has swindled banks and hotels all over the country by forged drafts, was arrested, yesterday, and looked up at police headquarters. He confessed his guilt to inspector McLaughlin. Howes is also known as C. A. Field and John B. Hall. He graduated as a civil engineer frem the state university at Seattle, Washington. Two years ago he married a girl graduate of the same institution. After his marriage he went into the real estate business at Gray's Harbor, Wash., and made money. This he gambled away in Denver and Kansas City by representing himself as D. J. Wakefield cashier of the bank of Elmer, of Chehillia county, Wash. He got a number of drafts. printed which he paid for with a bogus draft. The drafts printed were on the First National bank of Park City, Utah, of which afterward he claimed to be H. J. Denning, the cashier. Some of these were drawn on the Fourth National bank, of this city; some on the First National bank, of Chicago, and others were blank, He swindled Senator Allen, of Washington, out of \$700. The length of the list of his other victims is appalling. Howes said that to-morrow, he having engaged as a civil engineer to work in Central America, Howes will be sent to New Hampshire for trial.
