Sir William Vernon Harcourt Opposes Their Liberation,

London, Nov. 2 .- Sir William Veruon Harcourt, Chancellor of the Exchequer, who has been elected as Mr. Gladstone's him deputy in the House of Commons, is opposed to the release of Dr. Gallagher, Curtain and other dynamiters convicted of offences in Great Britain. It is the general impression in England that their chances of release are remote. The matter has been debated by the Cabinet in view of the intervention of the Washington Government in behalf of the Irish-American prisoners. A majority of the members of the Cabinet support Sir William Vernon Harcourt. It is pretty certain, however, that the appeal from Washington will cause a relaxation in the discipline to which these prisoners are

The Unemployed Hebrews of London to Parade Barefosted. LONDON, Nov. 3 .- The unemployed Hebrew workingmen of this city have decided that they will march barefooted through the streets of London on three different days. Agents of the Social Demogratic Federation are organizing the idle workmen. Their agents approve of marching through the streets. Another section of the unemployed, however, refuse to take part in the procession. They have taken advantage of the offer of the East End as sembly room, where they will register their names as wanting work.

TO BE EXECUTED ON TUESDAY. Neill is Dogged and Refuses to Speak of

Society Ladies in Court. LONDON, Nov. 2 .- The trial of the suit for damages for slander brought by Mrs. Leader, wife of Lieut. Leader of the British Army, against Mrs. Smith, wife of Major. General Gibbons Smith, was begun in the Queen's Bench Division of Her Majesty's High Court of Justice yesterday. The court-room was crowded, but there were no notabilities present. Among the early arrivals was Mrs. Leader, the plaintiff. She is a handsome woman, and appears to be about 30 years old. She is a daughter of Colonel Thompson, late of the Indian army.

Collision in the Mersey. LIVERPOOL, Nov. 2,-In the fog lirkenhead ferryboat, having 600 people on board, came into collision on the Mersey with the British ship Eurydice, Capt. Hinrichs. The bowsprit of the Eurydice swept the upper deck of the ferryboat from stem to stern. A fearful disaster was narrowly averted. One passenger was swept over-board and drowned. Several were injured.

NO PLEURO-PNEUMONIA HERE That is What a Meeting of Cattle Men

Toronto Assert. Tonoyro, Nov. 2.-The cattle deal and exporters whose business is centered in Toronto have actively taken up the matter of ferreting out the truth or fiction of the report that pleuro-pneumonia exists among Canadian cattle. It will be remembered that a short time ago a cow landed in Soztland off the Monkseaton was said to have been affected with pieuro-pneumonia and was immediately ordered by the veterinary department of the Privy Council to be slaugh-

The Dominion Government, on being notified of the fact, took active measures to ascertain the facts. The inspector of live stock for the Dominion, Dr. McEachran, was commissioned to use every effort to find out the truth and make, it known. Dr. McEachran is now engaged with a large staff, posted in different parts of the country, in performing his important duty. There were 700 cattle landed from the Monkscaton, and as these were gathered from different parts of the country it will be seen that he has no easy task before

Dr. McEachran arrived in the city yesterday, and in company with Ex-Ald Frank-land, President of the Dominion Live Stock Association, and Dr. Smith, inspector of live stock for Ontario, visited the Western Cattle Market.

Dr. McEachran announced that he and his staff were engaged in ascertaining the facts regarding the report which came from England. The 700 cattle were collected principally in Ontario, but a few had come from Manitoba. Veterinary men were under instructions covering all the districts from which the cattle came, and every farm was being visited, and special reports would be sent from each with the least possible delay. He asked several shippers for information regarding the recent shipment,

which was readily given. The chairman stated that owing to the very rigid quarantine enforced by the Dominion a disease such as pleuro-pneumonia bould not exist without the Government's knowledge, and certainly it would be known

to the cattle shippers if it existed.

After considerable discussion the following motion, moved by ex-Ald. Frankland and seconded by Ald. Crawford, was passed

That in our opinion no contagious pleuropneumonia exists in Canada and that this meeting do undertake to assist the Government officials in every way in their po wer to make the investigation now in progress effective.

Killing the Cattle. LONDON, Nov. 2 .- The slaughter of th 1200 head of Canadian cattle landed by the steamers Huronia and Monkseaton at Dundee began last Briday by the order of the Board of Agriculture. Scotch veterinary surgeons declare that the disease is not pleuro-pneumonia, but a non-contagious affection, the symptoms of which are similar, and condemn the Government as acting hastily. The Government has issued orders that incoming Canadian cattle be subjected to the sharpest scrutiny.

Canadian Cattle Must Be Scheduled. LONDON, Nov. 2 .- The Times says that Canada "can no longer be regarded as free from the cattle disease. The Ministry must choose between this class of Scotol grazers and the safety of the whole British herds. Pest cases have been discovered in the suspected cargoes. The Board of Agriculture has practically agreed that the disease is pleuro-pneumonia.

The Canadian officials here are urging that the decision to schedule Canada be delayed until the result of enquiries being conducted in Canada with respect to the existence of this disease in the localities whence the affected cattle are said to have come be made known. In view of this grave crisis Sir Charles Tupper will likely return to London from Paris at once.

WHAT BISHOP BROOKS THINKS.

le Does Not Believe in Close Sessions of the House of Bishops. Boston, Nov. 2 .- Bishop Phillips Brooks, who has just returned, from the Episcopal General Convention at Baltimore, in speaking of the work of 'the convention at a dinner of the Episcopalian Club last night, said of the "House of Bishops": "It is absolutely un-American in its practice of sitting with closed doors and it is a practice that is sure to be amended some day or other. This is one thing that certainly needs change; the breaking open of its concealment so that the people can hear not merely what has been decided in the house, but why it was done. To do as they do now is not only un-American, but is not in accord with the open and free spirit of Christianity."

The Bishop also said: "I have for a long time felt that another thing ought to be done: the entrance into our Christian miristry and exit out of it ought to be made easier than it is. Men ought not to be compelled to stay or go in disguise, when, in the best of the light which God has given them, they felt that their work lies there no longer.
