THE HAND THAT PULLED THE WIRES

of Parliament Gives Some side History of Le Caron, the Spy. Loupon, Nov. 4 .- There can be no doubt shat Thomas Beach, alias Henri Le Caron, is a man who in his time has played many parts, and some of them are not precisely those which a man with a high ideal of life would be anxious to fill. He acted as a apy for the British Government for a considerable number of years, and although that may at times be a useful and necessary function, yet most people would prefer not to take it upon themselves.

The special object for which Le Caron was employed was to keep a watch upon the Irish organizations which were "at war" with England, and it must be admitted that he carried out his share of the contract with a remarkable degree of success. He not only became a "head centre" of the Fenian organization, but he was made chief organiser of the "Irjah Republican Army," and nobody from first to last had the least suspicion of his true character. He took in the sharpest and shrewdest

members of the Irish Brotherhood, from Mr. Alexander Sullivan to Mr. Michael Davita He heard all their secrets, was a party to all their plans, and regularly communicated his information to the British authorities It seems incredible that, as man after man with whom he associated was betrayed, the treachery was never traced to Le Caron. Dr. Gallagher, the dynamitard, explained to him the movement by which, in 1883, he proposed to scatter terror throughout England. Gallagber went over in command of seven members of the Clan-na-Gael, and before two months had passed he and three of his associates had been seized, tried and sentenced to penal servitude for life. But the hand that pulled the wires was still

Turning the Tables. Once only Le Caron was charged with "suspicious acts," but he very soon turned the tables upon his accusers and found himself deemed worthy to receive the confi dence even of the late Mr. Parnell. It has been said that wherever three

Irishmen are banded together in a conspiracy one is sure to turn out a traitor. But Le Caron was an Englishman who had lived long in Paris, and assumed a French before the Parnell Commission in London. So far he has managed to elude the vengeance of his old friends-and dupes. He has certainly displayed great pluck and address, but I cannot help but wish him a better occupation.

Phat Administered. CINCINNATI, Nov. 4 .- A horrible case of torture came to light yesterday. For menths Mary A. Konacke, seventeen years old, of 94 Flint street, had been an invalid from dropsical consumption. Her father works in a farniture factory. Dr. Oelschlager, the family physician, pronounced the case hopeless but Tuesday last Guetav Hoyer, a horse dealer and liniment pedler, put in an appearance and declared he could oure the girl and the parents consented to the treatment. He brought a peck of timeby hay seed which he put into a tub and steeped in boiling water. He set a small chair in he water and stripping the girl's legs naked placed them over the water and covered them with beavy blankets. The hor -team burned her and she began screaming The mother and younger sister tried to get her away but the horse doctor stood guard and forced the girl to endure the torture for half an hour. Her screams alarmed the neighbors and an excited growd gathered but the "dector" would brock no in terference. Taking her from the torture of not steam, the "doctor" laid her on a bed. The skin hung from her legs in twisted strings. He bound the legs in linen bandages, drawing the rolls as tightly as he could, then ok a pint bettle of horse iniment and saturated the bandages.
