CURRENCY OF ENGLAND.**NEITHER A CONVENIENT MEDIUM OF EXCHANGE.**

FOR A FAIR PERMANENT RECORD OF OBLIGATIONS OVER A LONG PERIOD—UNITED STATES REPRESENTATIVES WITH BAILEFFE'S VIEWS ON BI-METALLISM ARE IN PERFECT AGREEMENT.

LONDON, Nov. 17.—Senator Jones and other American delegates to the Monetary Conference arrived in London yesterday afternoon.

Senator Jones said that the remainder of the day he would arrive at the Westminster Hall and that they intended to proceed to Brussels together on Monday.

The conference, he said, would probably last a month or six weeks, with three or four sessions each week.

Senator Jones paid a glowing tribute to Dr. Baileffe, of Ballarat, in his speech at Manchester on bi-metallism, wherein he declared that England's existing currency was neither a convenient medium of exchange nor a fair permanent record of obligations over a long period. He said that under either a standard which degenerates, let it be a standard in prices rather than a standard which appreciated.

Senator Jones added: "These are sound views, which the United States is ready to accept."

A WEDDING DANCE.**NINE KILLED INSTANTLY AND THIRTY SEVERELY INJURED BY FALLING WALLS.**

MOSCOW, Nov. 17.—A terrible story of the fatal accident which took place in Moscow is reported from St. Petersburg. A young couple had just been married in a church and the wedding party had gone to a restaurant, where a wedding feast was served.

After the banquet dancing was begun and the bride and groom were dancing with others, when, without any notice or warning, the walls of the building collapsed. The entire party, with the employees of the restaurant, were buried in the ruins.

A crowd quickly gathered and commenced the work of rescue. From amid the debris and smoke and heartrending cries for help could be heard rapidly as possible, and spurred on by the frantic appeals for help, the men threw the heavy timbers aside. They soon came across the terribly crushed and mangled bodies of the guests.

Twenty-four persons were taken out alive, but only seven of them were uninjured. The dead numbered 20, some of whom had been taken out alive but badly injured. When the wreck was cleared away sufficiently for it to be known that one man was also buried, nine bodies were lying in a ghastly row on the floor.

The injured numbered 30, some of whom will recover, others will be crippled for life. The building was thought to be perfectly safe. It is supposed the movements of the dancers caused the collapse.
