PUBLIC LIBRARY SOUGH? Q JEEN'S UNIVERSITY DROPS OUT OF THE PHOPOSED SCHEME.

Conference Between Committees of the Mechanics' Institute and the City Council-The Various Opinions Expressed and the Upshot of the Inter-

A con mittee from the mechanics institute, consisting of Mesers. W. Power, W. McNiel, J. M. Machar and J. Redden, met the school committee in the mayor's office at eight o'clock, last night, to consider the matter of converting the mechanics' institute library with the public school library and Queen's college library into a public school library. Of the school committee there were present Alds. Herald, Skinner, Meek, Elliott and the mayor.

In answer to Mr. Power the mayor explained, is reading the statute of Ontario, that the board of management of a public library would be composed of the mayor, three outsiders appointed by the council, three others appointed by the public school board, and two others appointed by the separate school board. The latter eight persons must necessarily not be connected with the city council, public school board or separate school board.

BIELA'S GREAT COMET

IT'S COMING VERY NEAR TO OUR EARTH. Astronomers Taking Great Interest in Its

Advent-A Shower of Fire Predicted For Nov. 27th-History of This Startling Wanderer of Infinite Space. Astronomers agree with remarkable unanimity that the earth will pass through a rain of fire on the evening of the 27th of this month which will far surpass the recorded benomena of the kind in startling if not

angerous effect. This phenomenon is not connected with the regularly recurring November meteoric showers, but will be due to the intersection nearest approach to the earth on record. and will be plainly visible to the naked eye in a few days and will increase in size and

This comet has a very singular history. It was discovered by M. Biela, an Austrian. officer, Feb. 27, 1826, in the constellation Aries when it looked like a small round speck of filling cloud. Since then the comet's path has been exceedingly erratic. In 1882, when it missed colliding with the earth by only one month, its proximity to the globe split the wanderer in two parts and each part made a perfect comet with a head and quisits for the calling forth and for the full tail of its own travelling in the same general
