The day following the robbery Ledgerkeeper Pennefather was stricken down with malarial fever, which showed evidence of he was lying in his bed that the inspector charged him with the crime, which he as well as his wife vehemently denied. The fact that Pennefather was taken ill the very day of the discovery of the robbery led to the suspicion that he was feigning, but a visit by a doctor engaged by the bank proved that the illness

Pennefather has been discharged by the bank authorities, not cause they charged him with robbery, but because he married without the consent of the officials. Pennefather's Story.

Here is what Pennefather, who is years of age, said about the robbery: "I left the bank early on the Wednesday night because I was sick. The next morning I got to the office at 8 o'clock and was surprised to find the teller's tin box on the counter. It was empty, and when Brown came in a few minutes later he was terribly surprised. I cannot remember whether he said he had neglected to put away his cash the night before. There is a rule n the bank that the teller must place his cash in the vault in the presence of two other clerks, but this rule has not been observed in the Standard Bank. If it had, the question of where the box was that night would easily be settled. Whoever got that money did not take it out the back door, for that was bolted from the inside, Moreover, it would have taken a big basket o carry off the money. Pennefather has been in the banking

usiness nine years, four of them in the ervice of the Standard. What Mr. Brodie Says. Mr. John L. Brodie, general manager o the Standard Bank, was interviewed and stated that the bank had not lost a cent through the robbery. He said: "Mr. Brown, sr., footed his bond like a entleman, and paid more than half of the

A COAL EXCITEMENT

An Inventor Starting Toronto Capitalists With His Gentus. Tonovro, Nov. 25 -- During the past few days a number of capitalists in Toronto have book startled with the idea that there may be a bed of coal underlying the surface of the ground
