

A Man Who Keeps Morality and Man-

hood Out of His Heart, DETROIT, Nov. 30 .- Edwin Crane, chief clerk of Dun's Mercantile Agency, who skipped out, led a most checkered career, as facts just come to light show. He was born in Northampton, Eng., and lived with his widowed mother, whom, it is said, he treated scandalously. His early life was one of recklessness, and he narrowly escaped jail before 20 years old. Under pretence of marriage he ruined a young girl named Agnes Burdett, and on the day set for the marriage he skipped out, robbing

his mother of every cent she had. He came to Montreal, and his fine voice and pleasing manner gave him a ready en trance to society, and while there he met a young French girl, Emilio Lafevre, He ruined her, and on the night before the day set for the wedding he visited her home, and stole from a fruit jar the money her mother had saved for her dowry. Crane had previously borrowed all the money he could lay his hands on and the next day skipped out again. He had been befriended by Collector of Customs Fornerett, and

on the day he left the commission for a clerkship in the Customs arrived. Ten years ago Crane arrived in Detroit. and through his voice again won friends and a place in society. He secured a position in Dun's Mercantile Agency and was it an extension from Zambesi to Uganda, and soon a trusted employe. Here he married negro boy aged 15, was hanged here to-day . However, Miss Lafevre became aware of Egypt. his whereabouts and wrote him letters for money to support his child. Friends to whom he confided his trouble advised him to send the money, and for three years he has been doing so. Tiring at last he wrote Miss Lafevre that he was to start to San



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
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
