


CIVIC GOVERNMENT. There is an increasing desire for change, radical change, in the government of the copie through the municipal councils. The feeling is that though in the multitude there is wisdom, and that a large number is better than a smaller one in the framing of useful legislation, the executive work of our cities should be discharged by a few who have a special qualification for the

duties devolving upon them. Within the last two months the agitatio of the people is taking definite shape. Thus in Winnipeg a new departure has been taken, and the mayor and a couple of colleagues, having consulted with the council on important issues, became the executive and see that the business of the city is carried on, in every department, as efficiently been working.

Oswego, influenced of course by the devotion of the people to American institutions, resorts to the ward caucus, and hopes, through it and by po mit of the legislature, to select a council with less of the tur mot! than it has now at every election. It

is proposed to divide the city into four districts for each of which a list of voters shall be prepared, and said list to represent the electoral constituency. At a certain day and time each constituency shall have r meeting, presided over by the mayor, and proceed "to choose from among the voters of its district its representative elector. The roll is to be called in voting, "and each voter may vote by ballot or by word of nouth, as he may prefer. A majority of those present and voting shall elect." The body of representative electors thus chosen to constitute the city college of electors, who have to appoint all officials and

govern and direct them in the conduct of the city's business, and all these proceedings shall be repeated every second car at the same dates.

Then the ratepayers' association of Toron which include the following: "That in cities. over 100,000 the functions of the council shall be purely of a legislative character, and shall have power to elect its own president; the executive being vested in the mayor, the president of the council and three commissioners, nominated by the mayor and approved of by the council, and shall have power to re-organize and control bers of the executive to receive a salary.
