DAVITT WILL RESIGN. He Wishes to Avoid the Trial of the Petion Against Him.

LONDOO, Dec. 3. -The Parnellites were ubilant when they succeeded in having Fullam, the anti-Parnellite, who was elected to represent South Meath in Parliament, deprived of his seat and there is a prospect that they will have further cause for joy in the case of Michael Davitt, against whose return from North Meath a petition has been presented. As in the case of Mr. Fullam, clerical intimidation in favor of Mr. Davitt is charged. It is expected that the judges, after unseating Mr. Davitt, will report Bishop Nulty of Meath and several priests of that diocese to Par liament as guilty of intimidation.

A FATAL JUMP. A Young Commercial Travelor Killed at Humilton.

HAMILTON, Dec. 5 .- The first fatal sec deat which has becurred on the Grand Trunk Railway in the vicinity of the station here occurred Saturday; Henry Melrar, a week, meeting his death in trying to heard a moving train. Meirar is a commercial traveler, his line of business being with the shoe trade. He arrived here on Saturday, Nov. 26, just one week ago to-day, and registered at the Royal Hotel.

Seturday he started for the station to board the 9.25 train for the west. As he got to the platform the train started. The platform was slippery after the night's rain and frost, but : Melear made a good run, and after passing two cars attempted to get upon the third-the car behind the smoker. He had a regular traveler's value in his right hand, and with this hand he caught the hind hand rail, and at the same time catching at the front hand rail with his left hand he jumped for the step. It was a fatal leap. He misred | f the front hand rail, and having ne support, he was swung around backwards between the two care and fell. The wheels of the car did not go over him, but he was terribly crushed diagonally

across the stomach by being squeezed be-

tween the truck beams and the roadbed.

His left arm was broken in three or four places and his head was bruised. The skin was not broken in any place. Deceased was a well-built, handsome and steady young man of about 28 or 30 years. He has no relatives here, and as far as is known this was his first business trip to this city. The body was removed to Blachford's undertaking establishment, where it was identified by Mr. Hood. Deceased had left instructions at the hotel to have his mail forwarded to Eler P. Melzar, No. 628 Ridge avenue, Evanston, Ill. A telegraphic message was at once sent to this address, carrying the terrible news. In his value was found an envelope, judged, from a note across the front of it, to contain papers.
