The Text Can be Glibly Quoted, But the Modern Dance Has no Connvenance In Scripture-It Was Not Conducted 14 Health, But Was to Cultivation of Sad

Rev. D. C. Sanderson selected as his text. in Brock street Methodist church, last night, Ecclesiastics 11.-4: "A time to dance." He said : Many a man who never read his bible, who laughed at its reproofs, whose life was in direct opposition to its teaching, who could not quote another passage of scripture to save his life, could glibly quote the text. The opponents of dancing were not all inside the church of Jesus Christ ; the advocates of dancing were not all outside the church. If dancing was right all ought to advocate it; if it was wrong obristians, at least, should abstain rom it. Among the Hebrews it was a religious act. Instances were given showing that in these dances the sexes danced spart. The modern dance was entirely different and found no countenance to scripture. Dealing with the subject fairly and temperately the speaker was opposed to it on
