

PROF. SHAW'S TALKS. The Empire pities Prof. Shaw, of the Intario college of agriculture, Guelph, be cause he had the temerity to discuss the losses which the farmers of Ontario will suffer by the operation of the McKinley bill, but the Empire itself is to be pitied for the nonsense which it retails in criticism of that gentleman. Note the assertion and the answer in a few remarkable instances.

Prof. Shaw says that immense damage

has been done to Canada by the McKinley bill, but that this damage will be greater and more apparent next year. Why ? Bo cause the Canadians "managed to forestall the closing of the American market by ship ping their eggs and barley across the border earlier than usual last season, but cannot do that next season." And is that not correct The Empire pooh poohs it and refers to our neighbors "hurrying up their importations from Canada through the offer of higher prices." But the Empire is dodging the point. The grain buyers of the Kingston district, conservatives, certainly made a big push to get across -the lines all the grain they could before the McKinley bill became effective; and

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
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
