"PLON PLON" IS DEAD

Prince Jerome Napoleon Benaparte Dead One of the Familiar Figures of the Second Empire th France.

Rosen, March 17. - Prince Rapoleon Joseph Charles Paul Bonaparte died this afternoon. Prince Napoleon has been a familiar figure in Europe for more than 40 years. Cousin of the man of destiny who was to become Emperor of the French and second son' of Jeromo Bousparte, at one time King of Westpholis, by his second marriage with Princess Frederika of Wurtemberg, he was born in Trieste and his earliest years were



He was a great traveler in his youth, visit ing protty nearly every quarter of the globe before his marriage in 1859 to the Princess Clotilde, daughter of King Victor Emanuel of Italy. As a Bonsparte be was forbidden to reside in Paris until 1845, when Louis Philippe granted him permission, which was soon withdrawn in consequence of the prince's compromising himself with the revolutionists. After the downfall of the Bourbous in 1848 the prince was elected to the Constituent Assembly. At the breaking out of the Crimean war he was put in command of an army corps, but, proving his incompetence, was recalled and piaced on "sick leave." His next military excursion was in the Franco-Italian war against Austria, which broke out imm-diately after his marriage with Clotilde. He crossed the Apennines in a march of great brilliancy and dash, but arrived in time only to witcom the signing of the treaty of peace at Villa. Franca. He visited the United States in

He refurned to Paris shortly before the outbreak of the Franco-Prussian war, but was again expelled in 1872, this time foreibly, for which he brought suit for damages. He then retired to his chateau, near Geneva, where he has lived with his wife and two sons, spending part of the time in Italy, where he died. Eugenie bated him and gave him the nickname of "Prince Plon-Pion," or "the dipper." His resemblance to Napoleon I. was very marked, and Beranger, alluding to Plon-Plon's fatness, said he was "a genuine Napoleon medal dipped in fat," whence came Eugenie's gibe at his expense. By his death his eldest son, Prince Victor, born in 1863, becomes heir to the Imperial thronewhat there is of it.

OVER 200 LIVES LOST.

THE STEAMER UTOPIA SUNK OF

BRALTAR After Culliding With Two Ironelads in the flay-She Had on Board 700 Emigrants en Boute to New York-Many Women

and Children Drowned. GIBRALTAR, March 17.—The British steam ship Utopia, from Italian ports bound to New York with 700 Italian emigrants aboard, collided to-day with the British ironclas Rodney, anchored in Gibraltar bay, and sank soon afterward off Ragged Staff, A southwest gale was blowing at the time of the collision. Many women and children were drowned. A large number clinging to the rigging have been rescued by boats from the Channel Squadron.

On entering the bay the Utopia before colliding with the Rodney ran into the British ironolad Auson. The Utopia sank within a few minutes. Boats were immediately lowered from the British ironclads and also from the Swedish man-of-war Erera. These boats rescued 180 persons who are now on board the various vessels Many others who were rescued are lodged in Government buildings on shore. It is reputed that the crew of tee Utopia were saved, but that over 200 passengers were 152 British Poers Own 1539 Places Where

THE GRAND OLD MAN DELIVERS A SERIES OF ADDRESSES ENGLAND.

He Pronounces Himself in Favor of Land Salisbury's Foreign Policy, but Consures the Chaucetlor of the Exchequer.-Pura- Il's Statements Contradicted,

LONDON, March 17 .- Mr. Gladstone Po ceived a tremendous and apoutaneous ovation to-day. He was leaving Churing Cross station for Hastings when an immense crowd gathered at the depot to witness his departure. The crowd cheere ! itself hourse after Mr. Gladstone appeared, broke down the barriers and made a rush for the "Grand Old Man," cheering and waving hate and bandkerchiefs as if mad with joy to see the veteran statesman. The railroad station fairly shook with cheers as the train bearing him moved out. Previous to the departure of the train the Executive Committee of the Radical Association presented an address to

When Mr. Gladstone's train stopped a Tunbridge, Kent, a large crowd was assemble

Mr. Gladstone replied to an address presented to him and said he hoped to shake bands with a Liberal member from Tunbridge after the next parliamentary election. He assured them that, whatever measure of Home Rule was proposed, its spirit and basis would be unchanged from those of the former one-(cheers)-that it would be compatible with English honor and would bring peace and contentment to Ireland and life to the nation.
