

no evidence to offer. Mr. O'Leary dwelt at length upon the importance of the case and the evil effects which the unpunished commission of this rime would have upon society. He outlined the evidence and impressed it upon the jury urging that it proved decisively that Bedore had accomplished his purpose

and that against her will and inclinations. Dr. Smythe, in defence, appealed to the jury as men to give the prisoner the benefit of the fact that no witness had testified as to the commission of the arime. He claimed that the case was only similar to one of those of almost every day occurrence, commonly called blackmail, and referr d to the lack of evidence as to the act except that of the woman herself. He drew particular attention to the fact that the woman when meeting her mother, a few minutes after the act

was said to have taken place, made no reference to the matter but proceeded with the usual routine of her household duties. His lordship urged upon the jury the serious consideration of all the evidence given and defined minutely the crime charged. He stated to the jury their liberty to bring in a verdict of guilty of indecent assault if the greater offence was found to be not proven, if it was decided by the jury that the prisoner had attempted it.

At five o'clock the jury retired and returned at seven o'clock with a verdict of "guilty" on the charge of rape. On the jury three men offered stubborn opposition for about one hour and a half contending that Bedore was not guilty of the grime. They finally agreed to believe the woman's statement.

The Judgment Given. In the case of Kent Bros. va. Hymop the judge directed that judgment should be entered declaring that Kent Bros. and Philip Beaslip were entitled under their executions against Abraham Hyssop to the goods seized as against John Hyssop, the defendant, but William McAdoo was not entitled under his writ of attachment against Charles Hyssop, the latter appearing not to have any interest in the goods seized.

The Sharbot Case. The grand jury during the afternoon brought in a true bill against Peter Sharbot for murder, and "no bill" in the charge against Cenilia Sharbot, Peter's wife. The case of the Queen vs. Peter Sharbot for the murder of the Indian child, was called while waiting for the other jury. The ndian was brought in, looking stolid and ndifferent. The clerk, Mr. McGill, asked him if he spoke English, and the prisoner answered "yea," whereupon the charge was read, and the prisoner pleaded "not guilty" in a low voice. The case was then adjourned to the next court, Mesers. Smythe A Smith giving notice of their intention to apply for ball on behalf of the prisoner.

The Mahood Case. The case of Mahood vs. James Richardson & Son and W. J. Wilson was then called. The particulars of this case and the parties nterested are well known to meet Kingstonians. In March, 1885, while Perry S. Mahood, then in the employ of W. J. Wilson, druggist, was working in front of the place of business & large mass of ice, hanging over the entrance, fell, striking him the left shoulder, felling him to the ground and rendering him unconscious. Since that time the plaintiff has lost the use of his left arm, and \$20,000 damages are saked as a part remuneration for this less. J. Melintyre put the case before the jury

He called to Mahood, whom he saw cutting ice beneath it. Mahood straightened up, but could not escape, as the mess of ice, as large as a small table, struck him, knocking him unconscious. Witness helped to carry him into Mr. Wilson's parlor.

John A. Charles saw the occurrence, and was about ten feet from Mahood when the ice fell from about the middle of the reaf. frozen snow. At this stage the court adjourned.
