

Would closer trade relations with the Empire be desirable? Would free trade with the world at large be desirable? And is our present policy of likely to be the first governor general of protection desirable! A great many questions must be asked before any satisfying answer could be given with a moderate degree of

sureness to the great final questions. Economically the whole question of "Trade Relations" belonged to the larger question of division of labor, and the first point to be settled was the desirability of ndividuals, and, secondly, as to localities If division of labor and co-operation, which it necessitates, are more evil than good then exchange of any kind should be dis couraged, but if they were beneficial then we should simply have to ask to what degree it should attain.

All progress, economic or social, is made possible through the mutual assistance of ndividuals, hence it is not hard to see what would be the consequence of every man protecting himself against every other man, which would leave humanity on the far side of barbariam.
