
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



Longon, April 9.-A Vienna despatch says that the Austrian Government, not being reassured by Russia's denial of unfriendly designs, has already concentrated large bodies of troops at Tarnopol and Brody to watch the Galician frontier. The 10th corps under Reinlander has been reinforced by a portion of the 1st corps and Prince Wirdisch-Grosts of the 11th is watching the frontler with a large force of cavalry, Count Hartenau, formerly Prince Alexander of Bulgaria, who is now an officer in the Austrian service, has, it is stated, been called into consultation at the war office with the view of utilizing his services in an important

The Austrian authorities have great con-Edence in the abilities of the Prince, which were proven in the war between Servia and Bulgaria. It is said that the Austrian Government has important secret information from Russia which is the basis of its warlike preparations.

The German Kaiser has laid out a personal program which apparently does not take into account an early declaration of hostilities. On the 23nd he is going to Wartburg for some black cock shooting, and after spending a few days there he will proceed on a visit to Count Goers in Upper Hesse, to shoot on his estates. The Emperor will not, na has been experted, go thence to Alsace-Lorraine. If he pays a visit to those provinces at all this year it will not be before September.
