

of the most shocking in the records of crime. The victims were two school girls, daughters of James McGonigle, a farm laborer living about two miles from Camberland, a vilage some eighteen miles below this city. The girls were 14 and 12 years respectively, and attended the village school. On the afternoon of Oct. 7, they left the schoolhouse at the usual bour for home. At a habit of parting from their young comhome through the bush. The first part of their way lay over a steep road, out through Mr. Gamble's farm, ending in a mere car track through a dense plantation of second-growth trace. At the top of the hill they met a son of Mr. Gamble's driving a wagon, and they were likewise seen by one of Mr. Gamble's mon, who was looking after cattle in an adjoining field. Their murderer is the only other person who is known to bave seen them again in life They did not get to their home that night, but as it was raining their parents conclud ed that they had remained at a friend's in the village, a course they had adopted on were injured, occurred at 4.10 p.m. on the stormy nights more than once before. When, however, they did not reach home after school hours on the following day their mother became aeriously alarmed. After supper the father started in to the village to make some inquiry. After diligent search be ascertained that the girls had started for home. The matter was canvassed among the simple villagers, and late at night it was determined to institute a search for them. Torches were procured, and the path along which they usually went through the bush examined. A little way off the regular way home the bodies of the two girls were found, lying almost side by side. It was easy to see

that a considerable struggle had taken place before the murderous brute who encompassleaves all about the snot were tossed, and the surrounding shrubbery had been beaten down and broken.
