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

The Charges Referred to the Committ on Privileges and Elections McGracty Declares Letters Purporting to Have Been Written by Him are Forgeries.

SIR HECTOR INDICTED.

MR. TARTE READS THE CHARGES TO

OTTAWA, May 11 .- At five minutes to o'clock this afternoon a dapper little French gentleman with a black freck coat buttoned called, and in a somewhat norvous manner sed the Speaker in French.

This was Mr. Tarte, and his purpose was the impesciment of Mr. Thomas McGreevy member for Quebec West, for having used his position as a member of Parliament and of the Quebec Harbor Commission to obtain from the Public Works Department inforhis own advantage, thereby making a conerable amount of money, said to be about

Mr. Tarte only spoke a few minutes in French and then proceeded in English, speak-ing with a strong accent, but clearly and with a good choice of words.

Mr. Tarte moves, seconded by Mr. Guay, that Mr. Tarte, a member of this House, having declared from his seat in this House that he is credibly informed and that he believes that he is able to establish by satisfactory evidence:

That in 1883 the sum of \$375,000 having been voted by the Parliament of Canada to carry out the works of the harbor of Quebec, the Quebec Harbor Commissioners called for tenders for dredging in connection with the

That Mesers. Larkin, Connoly & Co. tendered and were awarded the contract for the

Hon. Thomas McGreevy, then and now a member of the Parliament of Canada, and a member of the Quebec Harbor Commission by appointment of the Government of Canada, the firm of Larkin, Connolly & Co., with the knowledge of the said Thomas Mo-Greevy, took as a partner Robert H. I never found or knew any such or other officer of my department to be guilty of any indiscretion or breach of truss in con. nection with any tender or contract. Tenders are accepted, have been and are so accepted according to law, If the parties named in the motion as having contributed to a testimental presented to me some eight

I never asked the contractors named to the motion for money, crecks or notes nor did I receive any such checks, money or notes for my own use or advantage." He added that he had no vason to suspect Mr. Perley of having been connected with any of the charges made or having been guilty of any misconduct, and that as far as the member for Quebec West was concerned he was in the House and could speak for himself. Mr. McGreevy briefly stated that when
