





Coal in Washing Clothes. If women would use kerosene in washing clothes, it would save them lots of labor FIII your boiler half full of water and set it over to heat; then shave up a bar of galvanic soap, or any white soap that is recommended to do the washing by simply soak-ing the clothes in it, and boil together with five tablespoonfuls of kerosene in a couple of quarts of water till the soap is dissolved; then put it into the boiler. When the water in the boiler is boiling put in the clothes, simply wring out of clear water and buil the clothes from a half-hour to an hour Then suds in warm water, afterward rinse them in blued water. After they are dried they will be as white and clean as if they had been rubbed. The colored clothes may be washed in the same water, if it is not too dirty, only they, of course, must be rubbed instead of being boiled. A half bar of scap will be sufficient for a small family if the clothes have not been worn more than a week. If brown soap is used the clothes have to be rubbed some in the sudsing water. Just try it once.

New Style of Scrap-Basket. A new styte of a scrap-basket can be cheaply made by taking the sides of a stiff paste-board box and cutting them into engths of about twenty-five inches. Punch holes through the pasteboard on either side. and then lace them into the form of an oblong box with different colored lace or ribbon strings. Two of the corners should be tied by a double-looped ribbon or string. with tassels hanging down. The top of the basket should be covered with ribbon, laced down by silk cord. On the panel-like sides of the scrap-basket parat a back-ground of vellow, blue or terra cotta. Any kind of appropriate panel picturessuch as flowers, tall grass or marine views-

may be painted on the sides. Large, flaring puffs of silk half way down either corner of the backet should complete the design. Such a cheap scrap-basket is a splendid ornament for any room. 

The Papuans or Oceanic negroes, as the dark skinned races are called who inhabit New Guinea, New Caledonia, the Fiji islands and other places in the Pacific ocean, have a method peculiar to themselves. They split a piece of bamboo and making a notch in the convex surface of one of the pieces, they rub the sharp edge of another piece in it with a motion like sawing. They begin slowly, gradually increasing the speed until it is very rapid, and a hole is formed through the bamboo by the rubbing. The fine powder or sawdust rubbed off ignites with the friction, and the sparks fall through the hole on some dry tinder and brushwood, and a fire

is soon obtained.
