



That great engineering work, the Corinth Canal, which will sever the Peleponnesus from the mainland of Greece, and will permit the largest ships to pass directly from the Gulf of Athens to the Gulf of Cornith, is said to be rapidly approaching completion. The canal will have no locks. but is level from end to end and perfectly straight, the width being ninety-six feet and the depth thirty-six. At the Corinth end it is crossed by a railroad bridge 164 feet high. Under which the tallest ships, may pass without lowering their topmasts. With the exception of a short space in the centre, the channel, it is stated, has been excavated down to the sea level, and water has been admitted for some distance at the Corinth end, as also at the other approach.
