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

A WONDERFUL MIRAGE.

Acress Lake Ontario.

ROCHESTER, July 10 .- A mirage surpas ing in distinctness anything of the kind seen in many years, was witnessed from the tower of the Powers building. The lake appeared to be less than half a mile distant and St. Michael's church, which is a mile and a half away to the northeast, seemed to be less than a quarter of a mile off. The lake was apparently only a few hundred yards from the church and beyond the lake the shore of Canada appeared plainly in view. 
