



Ecible Birds' Nests. Edible birds' nests, of which we have all heard, form an important article of com merce between the islands of the Eastern archipelago and China, where they are considered to be quite a luxury. They are the nests of a species of swallows, not un like the bird with which we are familiar at home; it is about four inches and a half in length, with a great expanse of wing. The nest, which is small, is found in vast num bers in the great rocky caves which abound in some of these eastern islands; they are formed of a gelatinous substance, nearly transparent, and now believed to be a species of seaweed. The nests, which are so numerous as to be adhering to one an other, are collected by means of ladders and ropes; it is after the young are fledged that the nests are thus taken. In the Chi ness market they are sold at such a high price that they can only be purchased by wealthy persons. They are used to thicker
