RIOTS IN CHINA-

They Are Still Continuing-Much Damage Done-Many Drowned SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 12.—The S.S. ceanic arrived last evening from Hong Kong and Yokohama. Advices from Hong Kong up to July 15 state that the discontent is still smouldering in north China and occasional riots are reported. Mission stations, near Canton, are said to have been attacked, but no particulars are received. Two of the Wasueh rioters on trial, voluntarily confessed that they murdered two foreigners during the riots. The two prisoners were accordingly sent back to Kuangohi district

and executed on July 5th. Their heads are hung up at Wusucha as a warning to other A correspondent at Ting Kinng, under date of June 27th, writes that the vicercy wrote to the officials that the residences foreigners should be searched to see they had any infants or dead persons about. The Presbyterian mission was

searched by an official while growd of natives waited outside. The mob broke into the Catholic mission but were put out by occupants, Mr. Chulfant holding the rioters at bay with his re volver. The authorities finally sent military to the scene, and the soldiers guarded the

A telegram from Tienstin states that the French and British ministers in China have opened negotiations with Isungli Yamen in regard to their claim for indemnity on account of the recent riots. The sum claimed is 6,-000,000 taels.

Advices from Yokohama give further particulars of the sinking of the steamer Tamage Maru and drowning of 250 passes gers. Tamaye Maru and stegmer Myoshi were racing when the latter steered across the Tamage's course and the vessels came in collision. The Tamaye Maru eank ira mediately and only about sixty persons who were on deck were rescued.

THE PRINCESS LOUISE AND THE SWAN STRIKE

The Arcident Occurred in the Vicinity of Whiskey Island-The Swan's Stem was Somewhat Damaged-The Louise had Planks Stove in.

About nine o'clock, last evening, a steam boat collision occurred near Whiskey Island, the result of a misunderstanding between the captains. The sceam yacht Swan, full of pic-nickers, was coming from Knapp's point when the captain saw the steamer. Princess Louise coming down on her way to Gananeque. The Swan whistled for the Louise to get on the right side, but the master considered she could not cross in safety. He contends that if he had obeyed the order the collision would have been more serious. The Louise might have out the Swan in two. The boats kept their courses and the collision came unexpectedly for the passengers on both boa's. When he angineer of the Louise saw that the boats would strike he began to reverse his engine. The nose of the Swan struck the onise on her fore quarter on the right side. The Swap bounded back and ran up the side of the Louise, while she drifted towards the

main shore. It was with great difficulty she kept from grounding. The crew of the Princess Louise were anxione about the Swan and followed her to see if she needed amistance. Their fears for her safety were increased when they heard some person in the stern shout : "The Swan is sinking." She was luckily all right and able to keep aftent. Her stem is completely destroyed, and glass in her cabins was broken. Part of her timbers came into port this morning sticking out from the side of the steamer Princess Louise.
