

Louise is the oldest daughter of the ex-Grand Duke Ferdinand IV of Toecapa, and therefore not very close to the imperial throne, but she greatly loved in the court of Vienna for her amiability and kindness of heart. And it is by such unions as these that we have these two anomalies-every reigning monarch in Europe except the sultan of Turkey is descended on one side or both from John of Gaunt, son of Edward III of England, and nearly all the monarchies are ruled by families in which foreign blood

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
