A Letter From Manitoba Sotiars, Man., Aug. 27.-(To the Editor) The vitiage of Souris, formerly known as Plum creek, with a population of nearly 500, is beautifully situated on the high banks of the Souris river and Plum creek at their confluence. It is twenty miles south west of Brandon and is connected to the main line of the C.P.R. by the Souris branch which is being rapidly extended to the coal fields now being opened up by the C.P.R. under contract with the local government. The Glenboro line, which is completed to within thirty miles east of here, will connect with the south western branch at this point and bringing Souris a few miles nearer Winnipeg, will, no doubt, be the line over which will pass the enormous yield of this south western district, thereby relieving the main line of wuch traffic and greatly drunken man. The owner is now trying to facilitating exportation. Four grain ship ping elevators with an sapacity of 200,600 bushels in active operation this fail and winter. The fertility of the soil of the Souris dis trict is unsurpassed. Over half a million bushels of wheat from last year's crop were marketed here, and competent men esti mate the export from this crop at not less than 800,000 bushels. I could name you several farmers near here who raised from 8,000 to 12,000 Cashels of wheat last year. No less than nine different kinds of binders are on the market here, and the quantity of farm implements disposed of each season is almost incredible to one who has not seen it coming and going. So far as I can learn, the implement dealers use the farmers very fairly in regard to paying for machinery. If a man's crop is de stroyed he is allowed another year, and often two Instiour mill, which has won a well-deserved fame, sends its product to all parts of Canada. It turns out 150 barrels the year. There are two large hotels, stores of all kinds, and real estate offices, and many of the buildings would be creditable to much larger places.
