TERRIBLE FLOODS DEVASTATING THE PROVINCE OF TOLEDO, SPAIN.

Floods Also Reported From Almeria, Valencia and Bodage Many Persons Dying of Hunger-The Queen Gives 810,000-The News Growing More Appalling Hourly.

MADRID, Sept. 15 .- Official information terrible floods now devastating the Province of Toledo: According to the news received 2,000 people have already perished, and an immense amount of damage has been done by the swollen waters. At present it is utservivors, as all roads and railway communisation with the scene of the disaster have

Official telegrams report that 1500 persons perished in the destruction of Gonsuegra by the overflow of the Amarguillo. Hundreds of others were injured by falling buildings, and enormous numbers of cattle perished. At other places many persons were drowned and much property was destroyed. The Cabinet has decided to take measures

or the relief of the destitute. News comes in slowly from the flooded districts, each succeeding telegram adding to the public sadness.

The strongest efforts are being made to re-pair railways and telegraph lines, but the work must occupy some time while the gale

Fresh floods are reported in Almeria Four hundred houses have been destroyed in Almeria and many families made home-Consuegra and the occupants are buried under the debris. Two hundred bodies have already been recovered. Many persons are

dying of hunger.

The Queen has sent the superintendent of the palace to Consuegra to distribute money, clothes and provisions among the sufferers. The Queen gave \$10,000 to start a relief fund. A national relief fund will be open-

AN OTTAWA STRIKE.

Two Thousand Lumber Men Went Out Yesterday OTTAWA, Sept. 15-Two thousand men, mostly French-Canadians, employed in the sawmills here, struck this morning for reduction in the hours of work one hour and a half per day, and an increase of fifty cents in wages per week. Their demands are considered just, but the lumbermen say that they will not yield. At present they receive from six to eight dollars per week and work 114 hours a day, with three-quarters

The trouble began at six o'clock yesterday in the morning at Perley & Pattee's mill, when the men employed on the plat-forms struck work. They induced their fellow workmen, and noisy crowds shut down the mill and moved towards all the other mills. At Bronson's mill they forcibly compelled the men to stop work and shut off the water supplying the mills. The police were seen on hand, but the strikers offered no violence. They were very order-
