The Italian colony residing the neighborhood of Boyden and Nassaustreets have for several days been preparing for the celebration of the feast of St. Rocco. great crowd blocked the street. "A copper casing mortar was used for the bombs. These were filled with colored fire and shot into the air, where they burst, throwing out a shower of varicolored sparks. It was this nortar that exploded and caused all the harm; The bomb casing was about five inches in diameter and 30 inches long. About 11 of the injured and dying. Intense confusion followed. 
