WILLIAM HENRY SMITH. LONDON, Oct. 6 .- William Heary Smith, first lord of the treasury and government leader in the commone, died to-day. He had been ill for some time. His illness took

a sudden turn for the worse to-day, resultwifliam Henry Smith, was a son of the founder of the firm of W. H. Smith & Son, railway station news agent and booksellers. He was born on June 24th, 1825, and educated at the grammar school, Tavistock. The "D.C.L." represents a honorary degree con-ferred upon him in 1879 by the university ot Oxford. In 1874 he was made secretary to the treasury, which he held until August, 1877, when he was promoted to first lord of the admiralty. Lately he resumed a governmental office.

General Improvement But Bad Ventilating And Heating Service. On Monday afternoon the board of governors of Kingston general hospital met. Pro-sent: Hon. G. A. Kirkpatrick, chairman; Drs. K. N. Fenwick, Dupuis and Henderson ; Principal Grant; Mesers. Smythe and Pense. There were fifty-nine patients under treatment, three being typhoid, two diphtherial sufferers. One death in September. The balf year government grant just received was \$2,331, an enlarged amount due to increased service. There has been expended on building Nickle wing so far \$16, 564, besides \$1,131 contributed for furnish-

ing rooms. The bequests of the year have been : Campbell estate, Storrington, \$1,500; Mrs. Walker, \$500; Frank Fraser, \$500. The pressure for nursing services is so great two were authorized to be added to the staff of the young nurses in training, making thirteen in all, besides three elderly nurses in the large wards, and the male ward tenders.
