The death, by his own hand, of ex-Govwas not only a shock to all citizens of the state, but had a tendency to excite the superstitious. Governor Morehouse was the second , executive of Missouri to take his own life, and was the object of a peculiarly venomona prophetic curse de-livered by the aged father of that Maxwell who municred his traveling companion, Preller, in St. Louis some years ago.

Thomas Reynolds, of Howard county,

Mo., was elected governor in 1840. On the 9th of February, 1844, cloven months before the expiration of his term, he fired a pistol ball into his ead, and died after several hours of lingering agony. The Mormon prophet, Joe Smith, made much

A. P. MOREHOUSE. of this suicide Governor Boggs, predecessor of Governor Reynolds, had ordered the expulsion of the Mormons from the state, and had been shot, but not killed, while sitting at an open window. Governor Reynolds had striven so earnestly to have Joe Smith and Port Rockwell extradited from Nauvoo, Ills, that he had involved the two states in a judicial conflict, so his suicide was halled by the Mormons as a "judgment."
Albert P. Morehouse was born July 11, 1885, in Delaware, O., and went to Nod away county, Mo., with his parents in 1856. His aged father still lives on the old homestead. The son was admitted to the bar at Maryville in 1860, took an active part in politics as a Democrat, and after holding minor offices was elected lieutenant governor in 1884. On the death of Governor Marmaduke he became governor Dec. 29, 1887. Since retirement he has been busy in the management of his stock farm near Maryville, and overexertion led to a sunstroke, which was followed by typhoid fever and delirium. In a paroxysm of the latter he cut his throat with a pocket kuife and died in a few min-


