





The Last Great Triumph of Indians Over Whites.

ST. CLAIR'S DISASTROUS DEFEAT. The Soldiers Fought Well After the First Panie, but Little Turtle's Dusky Horde

Forced Them to Fly-President Washington's Warning. UST 100 years ago

-in the antumn of 1791-there on signal and-disastrous defeat ever sustained by the American army in all of its many buttles with the red men. This was the cout of General Arthur St. Clair by the Mi-

ami Indians of the Northwestern territory, an affair which has its parallel somewhat in Braddock's disaster thirty-six years before, in which engagement Colonel George Washington, as Braddock's chief aid, saved the command from annihilation after the repulse and death of his chief. President Washington in taking leave

of St. Clair, as the latter was about to start out on that ill starred expedition, addressed his old millitary associate with solemn

"You have your instructions from the secretary of war. I had a strict eye on them, and will add but one word-Beware of a surprise! You know how the Indians fight. I repeat it-Beware of a surprise!" No wonder that when the news reached him-through an officer who had been dispatched to the president from the frontier, and who arrived on horseback at the executive mansion in Philadelphia toward the close of a wintry December day-no wonder I say that the father of his country became terribly excited, and striking his elepched fists against his forehead in a paroxysm of anguish, exclaimed: "It's all over. St. Clair defeated-rout

ed; the officers nearly all killed-the men

by wholesale-that brave army cut to pieces—the rout complete! too shocking to think of—and a surprise in the bargain!" In view of the reverses which had befallen the American arms the year before in their encounter with these same flerce tribes on the Miami and Wabash, especially the command of General Harmer, one of the last measures adopted by Congress in 1791 was to increase the national forces to a suitable degree of power, and to place in the hands of President Wash ington more ample means for the pro. tion of the frontier, as the Indians on the northwest side of the Ohio river continued their hostilities. A new expedition, in consequence, was projected, and General St. Clair, then governor of the territory west of the Ohio, was appointed commander of the forces to be employed. Washington had been deeply chagrined and pained by the mortifying disasters to General Harmer's expedition to the Wahence his earnest warning to St. Clair to

guard against surprises. St. Clair was an officer possessing the prestige of veteran service and great bravery and skill in previous wars. A native of Edinburgh, in Scotland, he served under Wolfe in Canada; was a colonel, brigadier general and major general anocessively in the Revolutionary war, and took part in the battles of Trenton, Princeton and Yorktown and other engagements, and was in command at Ticonderoga when that famous fortress was necessarily surrendered to Burgoyne's overwhelmingly superior force. He was a member of the executive council of Pennsylvania in 1783; was elected to congress three years afterward; was its president in 1787, and upon the erection of the Northwestern territory into a government, in 1788, was appointed its governor, which office he held till 1802, when Ohio was ad-

mitted as a state into the Union. Under such a tried leader the troops began active operations in the enemy's country, and the entire nation, not less than its Illustrious head, awaited the outcome with deep anxiety, not unmingled with bright hopes of a speedy suppression of the frontier

The battle was fought Nov. 4, while the main body of St. Clair's army was encamped in two lines on rising ground, some fifteen miles south of the Mlami village on one of the tributaries of the Wabash, and the militta upon a high flat on the other side of the stream. The Indians were led by Michikiniqua, or "Little Tur-tle," a noted, able chief. The fight lasted nearly three bours, and was one of the fiercest known in military annals. The history of this notable affair is as follows:



GENERAL ARTHUR ST. CLAIR. On the 8d of November St. Clair formed his forces into two lines. The first line, under the command of General Butler, composed the right wing and lay with creek immediately in their front. The left wing, commanded by Colonel Darke, formed the second, and lay with an interval of about seventy yards between them and the first tine. The militia were advanced beyond the creek about a quarter of a mile in front. About half an hour before sunrise the next morning, just James Carnotts, who resides in Macoupin after the troops had been dismissed from county, northeast of Greenfield. The steer which had been formed the teatant the first gun was discharged, threw them likewise into disorder. Such was the panie and so rapid and irregular the flight—in this respect the prototype of

St. Clair, who was suffering severely from gout, was unable to mount his borse, and had to be carried about in a litter, from which he gave his orders with diseretion and the most perfect coolness. But he now realized that the firing by his men on the concealed redskins was practical abortive and that his only hope of success lay in the bayonet. Accordingly, he directed Colonel Darke to charge. That offiwent promptly and gallantly into the work, he making an impetuous charge upon the enemy, forcing them from their ground with some loss and driving them about 400 yards. He was followed by that whole wing, but the want of a sufficient number of riflemen to press this advantage deprived him of its benefit, and as soon as he gave over the pursuit the Indians re-newed the attack. In the meantime General Butler was mertally wounded, the left of the right wing was broken, the artillerists almost to a man were killed, the guns seized and the camp penetrated by the enemy. Another bayonet charge was

corning he ordered Colonel Darke, with the Second regiment, to charge a body of Indians who intercepted their retreat, and to gain the road, and Major Clarks, with his bathaliou, was directed to cover the rear. These orders were executed, and then a disorderly flight began. The purmiles, throwing away their arms along the road. Here they met the detached regiment, and leaving their wounded at the fort the army continued its retreat to Fort Washington, the site of the present city of Cincinnati. The whites numbered 2,000 men when attacked. Only half this force escaped the fury of the savages.
