His mother was a Georgian. The Sultan's general appearance is characterized by a sort of tired dignity, mingled with an expression of melancholic sadness, which is not without charm. His black beard, now slightly tinged with gray, is short, thick, and trummed almost to a point. The fore-head is broad, slightly bulged above the eyebrows, hollow at the temples, and wrink-led all over. The lines running down to the base of the nose, which indicate profound and meditative thought, are accentuated. The eye is dark gray, large, well formed, pensive, slightly veiled, penetrat-
