this letter to the Methodist people throughout the world : We, the members of the second seumen cal Methodist conference, assembled in Washington, greet our brethren in every land to which our common faith has apread,

"Grace unto you and peace from God, Our Father, and the Lord Jesus Christ." We glorify God for the prosperity which He has given to our churches. By His blessing they have grown until they number some twenty-five millions of adherents.
