-A Pleasant Railway Ride-Peterboro

ON A HOLIDAY TRIP. Condemning the Mode of Life of Farmers

Booming- A Description of Woodstock and its Prominent Institutions. Woodsrock, Ont., Oct. 25.—(To the Editor): I had a pleasant run last Friday over the Bay of Quinte and Canadian Pacific railways to Toronto. The railway service was excellent, the time good. There were no delays at any point. I ran across a gentleman who talked with vigor against the mode of life of the farmers. He declared that if they outsivated less land, if they surrounded themselves with more comforts, books, good food and good clothing, they might command the best places in the land, for no person is so independent as a farmer. If there was less grumbling, less desire to acquire land, simply to have the name of being a large possessor, then more of the boys would stay at home and the land could be

Then every foot would be silled, and tilled to result in benefit to the soil and the producer. Do farmers think so ? From Tamworth to Tweed the mari banks were viewed and many men found at work digging it to send it to Napanee mills. At Havelock I met Mr. Kane. He took me for a dry goods merchant in Kingston and asked numerous questions. He is cogaged in quarrying marble near that railway divi-sional point. He said it was a good quality. It was being taken out by Toronto parties. In the firm were Dr. McMichael, Q.C., and Thomas Ledyard, C.E. Havelook is a brisk

more capably farmed. The vigorous speaker held that a family could live well from the products of ten to fifteen acres of land.

It has a population up yesterday, killing George Magee and Ben of over 8,000 and has many choice residences. It has had a boom, but is not now as prosperous as could be desired.
