





The same "old bill of fare"-reast turkey and cra berry sauce. You can have that at dinner hour any day and every day; roasted in the same way, in the same old even, in the same old dish with the same old seasoning—the flavor of which gives the stereotyped turkey taste to the roast beef and the roast pork or the beef-and-pork taste of the turkey, "Be still, children! To be sure it's Thanksgiving day, but you must behave before these strangers. Be still, Ned. Hush Emilia. See that gentleman looking as you. I wonder who the new lady is."

The feature, the charm, the glory of Thanksgiving day is in the fact that it is the day of home coming, home freedom, home love. It is a protest in these latest days against hotel-life. It is a memorial of the most powerful civilizing and Christianizing agency of early pioneer life. 
