

Last evening the Rev. Dr. Sexton deliver-ed his sixth and concluding lecture in Queen street church, his subject being "Science and the Ribie." There was a very large at-tendance. The doctor said, that in the minds tendance. The doctor said that in the minds of many persons there was a great conflict going on to-day between modern science and the teaching of the hible. He, however, proposed to show them that both were perfectly in harmony, and that the discrepancy was imaginary, not real. They must, however, distinguish between true acience and the speculations of scientific man on the one hand; and between the real teaching of acripture and the interpretations of commentators on the other. His first position was that the bible did not claim to teach science. It had a far higher end in view. It contained a revelation from God to man, pointing out how salvation might be obtained. It was
