AGRICULTURAL NOTES

The Air ned Sun in Farming. The air is the other store-house of pirt food. Between 92 and 98 percent, of all the substances of plants comes from the air.

ante grown a suitable dir ance apart, as ar as practicable in order that the air may irculate freely and the sun shine in brightly at the plants may get from the air ti food it contains for them. This is on reason why it does not pay a man to grow a crop of broadcast corn; the stalks are so close together that there is not enough cirmistion, the plants have less vigor and the soil becomes exhausted. The spring in my watch is merely who the plant food is in the soil. The spring i a contrivance into which I store my own

strength; the plant food is a convenience into which the sun can store his strength his energy. And then, when a horse cate into horse power, the power which the sun rolled into that peculiar plant spring. In that way the sun is doing all the work of the world. A long time ago the sun was shining down on the earth, hotly, vigorously and continuously. He was rolling himself up, year by year and century by century into plants—plants that stored his strength with avidity. Then there came great changes in Nature and those big trees and plants, full of the sun's energy, were buried away down deep in the bowels of the earth; but still they held the sun's strength. Men open mines, they dig up concrete sunshine and energy, in the form of coal; the furnace is filled; the magic liberator—fire—is applied; and as the mighty engine moves, wheels are turned to-day with the energy which the sun wound up in the vegetable kingdom of the earth ages and ages ago. The man who furnishes

plant-food for the young plant, keeps the sun idling on his field all the day long. So a man ought to make it his pleasure, as it is his privilege to harness the old sun every day in his farm work, and make it do his will by making it roll its strength into such plants as he wants for his service. New, a man could never afford to hire half a dezen men on a farm and have them "loaf" all day long, while he is wearing himself out with working. But the man who wears himself out with working and keeps the sun idling all day long, is doing a far more foolish thing. So a man should recognize that he has the right—that he has the power—to control the sun's working, make it work upon his fields and thus save himself from the repreach of leaving the best working power in the world idling on his place. The power in the world idling on his place. The farmer requires skill, he needs knowledge, he must have above all things good judgment in order that he may fitly control and exercise the power placed at his command.

Let me show you what all this means, practically in Dairy Farming. The man who farms successfully and skilfully in Dairy Farming will always have abundance of plant force in his need and therefore he of plant food in his soil, and therefore he will keep the sun working for him by giving the sun the raw material out of which to build plants. If the sun be deprived of that he does not intend—using the word figuratively—to work; he will not make bricks for any man without clay. There are men who are all the while running counter to these old foundation laws that were made for agriculturists. One man thinks that it makes no difference how much sunshipe he has or how little. It makes all the difference in the world, and that is why in Canada we have the best chance in all the world for making farming pay, because we have more aunshine than they have anywhere with an equally favorable climate in other respects.-From an address by Prof. Rob

Scarlet Clover. Of late years scarlet clover has become great favorite with the farmers, and there are now perhaps ten acres sown for one few years ago. The uses to which it is applied are principally three. First and most important as a fertilizer, especially on light and poor land where the common red cloves would not do well. On such land, when acempanied with a small application of super-



SCARLET CLOVER, FOLIAGE AND PLOWERS phosphate of lime, it will make a fai plowed under and the ground tilled in any crop desired. But the most popular use made of it as a fertilizer is in our peach orchards. As soon as the fruit is gathered the orchards are prepared for the clover seed by plowing, harrowing, and rolling. The seed is then sown breadonft and brushed or rolled in. By brushing is meant the dragging of a large branch of a tree with the folinge on over the seeded ground, thus smoothing it and slightly covering the seed at the same time. The second use is for feeding green time. The second use is for feeding green to stock. With dairymen and farmers who soil their cattle it is highly prized for this purpose. Many feed it to their horses also, and some veterinarians say that it is an excellent forage for driving horses, as it does not scour. The third use is to grow it for seed for market. When this is the aim it should not be cut till mature, and then early in the morning or late in the comthen early in the morning or late in the even-ing, as the seed shakes out easily by handling, and much will be lost if handled when very iry. The same care must be used after ward when curing to be threshed. The

yield of seed is usually about six bushels per acre, and the market price about five Although clover will do well on poor ground it will respond to generous treatnent and make a much larger growth in a richer soil. I have measured stalks over forty inches in length, and I have no doubt that it can be grown much taller and so rank that plowing it under becomes a serious task. When in bloom it is a brilliant and beautiful sight, and very striking to the eye. It is sometimes seen in the head rows, and makes a very handsome border.
