A GRANT TO THE SHOW

TWO CENTS

ASKING THE COUNCIL FOR THE NEEDED ACCOMMODATION.

Ald. Polson Dtd Not Want Any Action Taken Before Information Was to Hand-Sending Out For Fair Officers-The Final Result-The Grant Made.

There was a vigorous dubate, last night the city council over a communic from Heary Wade, secretary of the agri culture and arts association, asking for the same accommodation for the province show as afforded in 1888. The council would meet at Guelph on Dec. 9th and 10th. Aid. Poison wanted the matter sent to the Midland fair association and the council the amount of accommodation needed, Ald. Hardy said the council should willingly grant the same accommodation as proviin 1888. He moved, seconded by Ald. Skinner, that the same accommedation be turnished the association as it had in 1888. The secretary was instructed to write to the

Ald, Polson did not want such a resolution passed; the council should not so seriously commit itself without information. He wanted the fair, but he also wanted to know what he was doing. Besides no provision had been made in the budget for the expenditure. Aids, Gaskin and Muckleston orged that accommodation be provided.
Ald. Polson, however, wanted to know, you know. He objected to bringing in matters without particulars. He wanted business, not sentiment, to ruic. Ald. Herald said to send the matter to the finance committee, to consult with the Midland fair association Ald. Polson moved, seconded by Ald. Cliff, that the communication from H Wade be referred to the committee on finance to ascertain the probable cost of the increased accommodation, if such is required, and that a special meeting of the council be held to receive the report.

Ald. Hardy thought the council would be behind if it did not set at once. A larger amount of money would be spent in the city, on the occasion of the fair, than had been spent at any previous fairs. The counoil should guarantee the necessary accommo-

Ald. Poison said they had no right to commit next year's council to anything. Referring to the liberality of the merchants he said it was clear that his contention was right, that men who are especially benefited by a fair are willing to pay for it, and people who are not benefited, should not be called

upon to pay.

Ald. Gaskin said he would not vote for a guarantee when the board did not know what the amount would be.. The council once did this and the accommodation cost \$3,000.
