vertical water motors. The church is lighted by gas and electricity combined. A beautiful chandelier purchased in New York, is suspended from the centre of the hall, with eight clusters of side lights. The organ is mounted on a platform to light the main chandeliers in both the church and hall. An apparatus is also being introduced, under direction of Dr. Connell, consisting of a sound recorder in the pulpit with certain paws, whereby the deaf may both hear the voice of the minister and the music of the choir. By providing another vestry arrangement was made to obviate the need of the pastor to stand before the pulpit and command platforms are furnished with black walnut covered with plush.

The organ was manufactured by Messrs. Pennington & Baker, of Danvers, who built

in mahogany with a true case and

conveniently laid out so that there is no undesirable sitting in the church. The case stands on four legs, which are very prettily and ingeniously designed.
