THE PARNELL CASE.

The Parnell Times inquiry promises to be an interminable affair. It gets no nearer the point at which all interest in the case centres from week to week, and the court seems to be indifferent in regard to results, or powerless to change the current of events. The expense of the trial-is tending to the bankruptcy of Mr. Parnell, but unless heis found guilty of the offence charged against him, namely to identify him through correspondence with agrarian outrages in Ireland, he will be a greater man than ever, and his friends and admirers will see to it that he is placed in a position to continue, without financial embarrassment, the leadership of the Irish party. He hesistated about going into the case against the London Times, and present experiences show that he hadreason

INDEPENDENCE DISLIKED.

The conservative press of Quebec is par ticularly severe upon Mr. H. Stearns be cause he chose to vote openly against his party in the division that occurred in the legislative council on the Lavallee case. It is a rare thing to see a conservative stand ing on his dignity and acting according to the dictates of 'his conscience. Against Henry Stearns nothing can be said touching the morality and purity of his action. He has been accused of a leaning towards the present provincial government under circumstances suggestive of undue affection, but the insinuation has no point, and is in dulged in only by those who would deny to any man belonging to a party the exercise of his personal judgment. The political faith of no man amounts to much who is what he is by force of circumstances over which he has no control. He is best entitled to respect who thinks for himself, judges of parties as he finds them, and believes in their general policies and is disposed to work in harmony with the one or other of them as the merits of any issue deserve. Hon. Henry Stearns is a conservative of eminence and has done his party a great service, but if he, on any point or on any occasion, decides to vote against it he is only asserting a right which no one can question. He will probably survive the criticism to which is now submitted. It is hoped so at anyrate.

SALISBURY'S SLIP. The Earl of Salisbury appears to have made a serious blunder when he consented to act in conjunction with Bismarck in the suppression of the South African slave trade. Against the evil of buying and selling human flesh, and especially against the corrupt and brutal traffic practiced by the uncivilized tribes of Africa, the British nation has a right to lend assistance. But Salisbury, while anxious to maintain the spirited foreign policy to which his party is committed, should have treated Bismarck's overtures more diplomatically. The old war horse is not given to much sentiment, to much waste of time and talent upon schemes which are not in some way concerned in the exaltation of Germany's greatness. And when he pressed for hurried and vigorous action Salisbury should have been on his guard. He should have satisfied himself that the object aimed at was the extinction of the world's greatest wrongs. Ostensibly that was Bismarck's purpose, but really to found a South African German colony. Will be succeed? Time will show. Meantime the natives have not been conquered. They have been simply more disturbed than usual, made more savage than ever, more determined to indulge in slaughter and wade in the blood of innocent ones. In the development of the policy which has been imperfectly prepared and deceptively matured blunder has succeeded blunder until the situation has be a serious one. Salisbury is now a worried man. 'He ought to have known Bismarck, and yet he did not. The experience he is now passing through is not calculated to add to his peace of mind or to the confidence of the people in his political sagacity.

POLITICAL PUFFING.

The conservatives of the city, no doubt, feel better now that they have in convention assembled, informed the world of the wonderful things they have done. No objection can be taken to their converting their association into a sort of mutual admiration society. But when men are excited, when applause turns their heads, they say some things that are indiscreet.

For instance Mr. Macdonald put a fearfully low estimate upon the merits of his party when he announced that its life and death depended upon the life and death of Sir John Macdonald. Had a liberal given voice to the same idea, in public, he would have been savagely set upon by his opponents, and, metapherically speaking, torn | derson's bookstore. Plan now open.

limb to limb. But it is the conscientious conviction of an ex-president of the conservative association, of one who has, in his political career, projected some very remarkable opinions and forced the people to listen to him on the ground that they were in accord with his convictions. The congratulations sent to the premier, on the attainment of his 75th birthday, were, we are informed, joined in by the liberals of the city. The liberals, by this action, showed how magnaninous they are. They acted upon the kindliest impulse, and without indulging for a moment in the thought constituting the opening of Mr. Macdonald's most mournful wail-after Sir John, the deluge.

Another speaker, equally unbalanced, said he believed with the Toronto man that Si John would never die. A second specimen of extravagant language. It is descriptive of a condition of things in which even Sir John does not believe. He expects to die, and to go to a land so located that he can look down upon his people, and, as it were, guide them by his eye.

It was only the other day that the premier spoke cheerfully of the future of his country and his party. While pleased with the congratulations of the local association he must, if he reads the papers, be struck with the eccentricities of his friends.

A GREAT MISTAKE.

The Ottawa correspondent of the Empire has made a great mistake in telegraphing the following to his paper:

"I learn from most positive sources of information that Hon. Mr. Laurier has sent a confidential circular to each of his supporters in the house of commons notifying them that, in view of the annexation movement which has sprung up recently in the United States, and for fear that it may be connected with the unrestricted reciprocity movement in Canada, to the detriment of the reform party, it has deemed advisable to drop the reciprocity agitation to Canada, and revert during the coming session to the stand the reform party took in 1879 ad verse to the national policy."

Now this seems to be a case of pure in vention. Nothing which has transpired in the United States can injurously affect the position of Hon. Mr. Laurier with regard to reciprocity, and, certainly nothing has occurred to make him abandon what is now a leading plank in the policy of the liberal party. That party has been accused of ardently advocating annexation, that is with championing a national policy which admits of the entrance of American influence into Canada's political affairs, but it is an accusation without just and reasonable foundation. Hon. Mr. Mowat expressed the feelings of many of his countrymen when he said that the political parties of the United States were too anta gonistic to those of Canada to expect a movement, looking to the annexation of the two countries, to be regarded in a friendly way. The liberal party has as emphatically repudiated annexation as the tory party and those who show a strict adherence to the truth will not dare to say that one is more loyal than the other. As for recipro city it is a question which admits of treat ment in a business more than a political sense, and as something calculated to benefit Canada commercially. Hon. Mr. Laurier is still an advocate of it. He has no notion of abandoning it, and of asking his followers to do the same. On the contrary he has notified his friends that it is a live subject, that it is well esteemed by the people, that it really contributed to the election of a liberal in Joliet, a constituency that had never before made such a choice.
