Seeking Equine Information.

Kingston Township, Jan. 22.—(To the Editor) :- I noticed veterinary surgeon Massie's remarks in last week's WHIG on the culture of horses. He tells the farmers to breed such borses as would be fit for saddle and carriage work. First, let me ask what constitutes saddle or carriage horses ? What weight and height should they be? And what form should be either one of them, and where would he have market for such animals? Would it not pay the farmers of Canada to breed heavy horses, such as Percherons and other Clydesdales? There is good demand for these horses in our home market. A good Clydesdale grade is worth from \$200 to \$300. A good Percheron is worth from \$100 to \$200, while a good saddle horse is only worth from \$80 to \$175. A carriage horse will bring about the same figures. If a farmer breeds a saddle horse and has the misfortune to get a blemish on him, what shall he do with him? Though the blemish does not interfere with his usefulness, he would have to sell him at a sacrifice, for he is not large enough to work. On the other hand, if the farmer has a well bred beast and the progeny is selling for large sums, why not continue to raise such? Why would it not pay to raise coach horses, as there is greater demand for them in a American markets. As they are larger breed than saddle or carriage horses they are more useful on the farm. Then why not breed them ?- CANADIAN FARMER.
