"Not that we have been able to discover." "Wall, that's strange. Did you tell any of 'em that I had joined this society?"

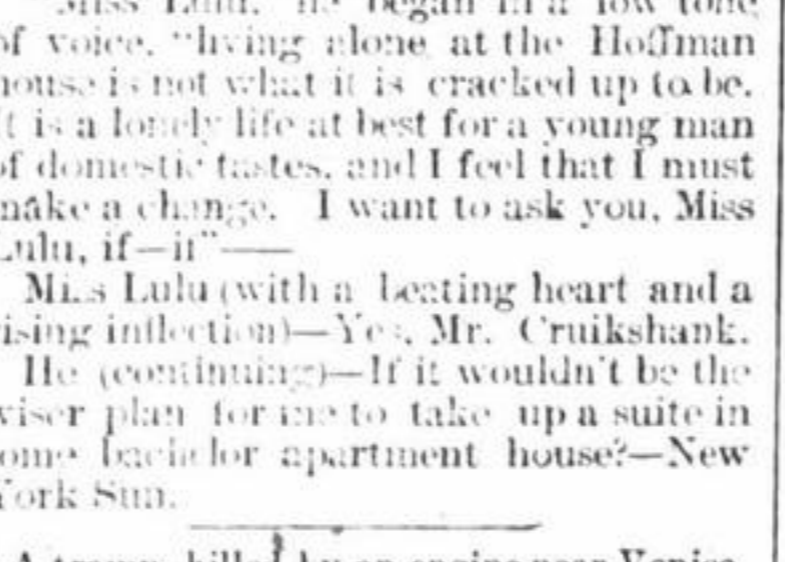
"Oh, no; we do nothing in that line." "Then you don't make the press talk about a fellow?"
