JACQUES, BOULANGER'S OPPONENT

He Is Quiet and Extremely Conservative, and Represents a Strong Faction.

The Parisian newspapers and politicians, only a few days before the late election, suddenly awoke to the fact that it was not the city of Paris only that they had to consider, but the "department of the Seine." That that department included Sceaux, Saint Denis, Asnieres and other important suburbs -indeed, all the environs, the "banlieue," as they call it. And all the "banlieue" is as conservative as Paris is radical; calm and business like, while Paris is agitated. And, therefore, the "banlieue" gave a strong support to M. Jacques," the opponent of Gen. Boulanger.

M. Jacques is the very incarnation of quiet, commercial conservation. Engaged all his life in business, he has held important

positions in the local government; his face wears the quiet smile of the social and successful merchant; but his gray mustache gives an air of dignity, and even of sternness, to an otherwise jovial countenance. Paris and its su-

burbs have a sort of local parliament

or council of two chambers, and there is much the same difference between them as between the French senate and lower housethe latter all agitation, feeling every wave of popular action and reaction; the former calm, modest and laborious. Well, M. Jacques is the oldest suburban representative in this local general assembly, having been a member eighteen years, and served two or three terms as president, and all this without attracting much attention. He has been elected as member without contest, and as president with very little, and has served quietly and without bluster.

Besides M. Jacques is the most extensive manufacturer in France of absinthe and vermouth. He is known the entire liquor trade and thousands of the Paris cafe and saloon keepers are his customers. As he formally engaged to bring the neglected interests of the trade before parliament, the entire influence of the liquor interest was brought to bear against the general.

All this gave the greater significance to his campaign against Gen. Boulanger. It was not enough for the latter's opponents that they could show a formidable opposition; they wanted to emphasize that opposition by giving it to the very quiet citizen against the very noisy general. It was the concentration of the bourgeoisie, the business and citizen strength against the warlike elements. A quiet, very pleasant man who had made no enemics, was relied on to beat the violent Boulanger. The usual line of discussion was completely reversed; it was not to elect a candidate, but to beat a candidate, that the fight was made. "His qualities are merely negative," shouted the Boulangerists. "Indeed! And are such negative qualities of reliability and safety so common that they must be ignored f" retorted the Conservatives.

But M. Jacques has many and valuable positive qualities. His supporters call attention to the fact that he is sufficiently radical te satisfy all reasonable men of advanced ideas, yet cautious enough to do nothing rash, thoroughly experienced as to local needs and above suspicion in the matter of integrity The French seldom mention a man's age after he reaches the neighborhood . • 60, and it is apparent that M. Jacques has reached it.

SENATOR-ELECT W. D. WASHBURN.

He Is One of Minnesota's Pioneers, and Has Served in Congress Before.

W. D. Washburn, lately elected senator from Minnesota, is a New England man, hav ing b en born in Androscoggin county, Me., fifty-eight years ago. Until the age of 20 he lived on his father's farm, obtaining what education he could at the district school and at the Gorham academy, until he entered Bowdoin college, in 1851. Here he took his degree in 1854. Like many men who have been unusually successful, he paid for his own

education by teaching school in the winter months and working during vacations. He studied law and was admitted to the bar in 1857. He immedidiately started for the west, and hung out his shingle in Minneapolis, then a not over prosperous



village. He was appointed agent of the Minneapolis Mill company, then little more than a baby adventure. He is now part owner and director of the

mill company. In 1861 he was appointed surveyor general of Minnesota by President Lincoln, and in 1865, when his term had expired, he built a large sawmill and engaged in the lumber trade. He soon built up an enormous business, and is now very wealthy. He was the prime mover in the Minneapolis and St. Louis railway, and is president of the Minneapolis, Sault Ste. Marie and Atlantic Railway company, which will finally connect Canadian lines, so as to save 300 miles in the

distance to the senboard. Mr. Washburn is an experienced politician, having served both in the legislature of his state and several terms in the lower house of congress. He has a magnificent residence in Minneapolis and is fond of luxurious living.

THE SAMOAN DIFFICULTY

It Will be be Still Further Discussed at

the Conference at Berlin. LONDON, Feb. 6. - A Berlin correspondent understands that the United States has consented that the Samoan conference be con-

tinued in Berlin. NEW YORK, Feb. 6. - Secretary Bayard yesterday made the following statement to the Herald's Washington correspondent "The Samoan correspondence with Germany is being conducted by Prince Bismarck through the German minister at this capital, and for that reason Mr. Bayard confines himself to that channel of intercourse and expression. The general tenor and friendly tone of Count Herbert Bismarck in relation to the Samoan affairs, as reported in the Herald, is in general accord with that employed by the Prince chancellor. With the resumption at Berlin of the amicable conference (which was suspended at Washington on the 26th of July, 1887) in accordance with the proposal of Prince Bismarck, and which is acceptable to this government, there seems little ground to doubt that a peaceable and permanent settlement of all the questions of native and rights in Samoa, as well as the rights of the three treaty powers, will be attained. But further than to comment in terms of general approval on the good temper shown by Count Bismarck, in relation to the United States and the resolve to keep all the questions involved in the atmosphere of diplomatic settlement, it is more respectful to congress that Mr. Bayard's communications should be laid before them and in that may be made public."
