SKIRTED, BOOTED SOLDIERS.

Twenty-three Staten Island Girls Practising the Military Drill.

Twenty-three pretty young women of Staten Island, New York, recently became fired with the idea that women would make better soldiers than men and have formed themselves into a company called the "Brighton Blues." They do not, like the shapely Amazons of the stage, don the silver tights, but their uniform consists of a plain, loose skirt of dark blue, reaching to a little below the shoe tops, and a tightly fitting waist of the same color, the collar and sleeves of which are trimmed with three stripes of white braid in the case of the privates and gold braid on the officers' uniforms. This is supplemented by the reg-

ulation peaked cap and shoulder straps. The captain wears a small white plume on her cap, and in lieu of shoulder straps a pair of gold epaulettes adorn her shoulders. The officers are distinguished according to their rank by the customary insignia of the regular army.

The company has a captain, first and second lieutenants and sergeant. A corporal of the regular army, from Fort Wadsworth, is the instructor of the company in military tactics.

"As the girls stand in line awaiting the word of command, with heads erect, shoulders squared and heels together, they present a picture worthy the brush of an artist," according to a New York World reporter. "Every known variety of girl is represented. Blondes and brunettes, big girls and little girls, robust and slim girls, girls who glance wickedly out of the corners of their eyes at the spectators and girls with spectacles which make them look like the intellectual Boston product—all are here. That they mean business is evident from the determined expression of their faces and the close attention paid to the directions of their instructor. They are first put through the facing movement, which they perform with a clockwork exactness which would first astonish the most experienced of Uncle Sam's veterans. They are then put through a series of marching movements, and the drill of the hotel, which has led to the possession of only half or less of the results with the first trial of the girls in line. These maneuvers, some of them very difficult and intricate, are executed very creditably by the corps. Beyond an involuntary desire to grasp each other's hand or an occasional clutch at a companion's dress when wheeling, the girls do remarkably well.

"When marching they step out with a bold, free movement from the hips which, albeit somewhat masculine, has nothing of constraint about it. That grace must not of necessity be sacrificed to military precision in attitude and walk is fully exemplified by the movements of these girls, who form a striking contrast to the stilted and wooden appearance of the average national guardsman. The beautiful exercise incidental to constant practice in marching and wheeling already shows its effect on the physical development of the girls. Not a round pair of shoulders is anywhere discernible. The girls are as erect as the traditional arrow and look alert and vigorous.

"As soon as they have sufficiently progressed it is the intention of the corps to give a series of exhibition drills for some benevolent charity. The girls have every confidence in their ability and are prepared to enter into competition with all and any masculine corps who may have the tenacity to dispute their supremacy. Applications for membership are fast pouring in, and the number will be limited to about fifty, a great many aspiring candidates will be disappointed. As this latest fad is beginning to take firm hold on the minds of the young women on the island who formerly had no longing for distinction save that to be acquired on the tennis field, it is very likely that those who cannot obtain membership in the original corps will form new organizations, the number of which will be limited only by the supply of drill masters obtainable."

The captain of the company, a pretty blonde, has the following to say of the origin of the idea and its subsequent development:



"FORWARD MARCH!"

"The idea occurred to me last winter from a picture in St. Nicholas representing a group of young ladies in military costume. I am very fond of military drills and at once proceeded to sound some of the young ladies on the subject. They took readily to the idea, and we immediately proceeded to put the scheme into practical shape. As soon as our organization was formed a drill master was obtained from Fort Wadsworth, and we kept up our drills until warm weather interfered. The girls were so enthusiastic and derived so much pleasure from the practice that we determined to renew our lessons during the present season.

"Although it looks like fun to an outsider, it is real hard work, but there have been no defections from the ranks on that account. We intend to work harder still until we are perfect in every detail of military tactics. We have not taken up the manual of arms as yet, as our muskets are not ready. We expect to have them in a short time, and as soon as we have had sufficient practice we will be prepared to give either exhibition or competitive drills at least once a week. We are all thoroughly in earnest in our desire to become proficient in everything pertaining to military tactics, practically as well as theoretically. This is no passing fancy born of enui, but a desire to profit by our instruction physically as well as mentally. The exercise incidental to the drill has had a wonderful effect on the physical development of the girls, which no amount of perfunctory gymnastics could have produced."

DON'T TALK OF EUROPE.

The Evidence From It Very Bad-Latest of a Medical Journal.

We still sometimes have retailed to us the old absurdity about the sobriety of continental Europe, where there is a good deal of drinking of light wines and beer. Unfortunately the evidence will not sustain the "sobriety" doctrine. The British Medical Journal, of Nov. 17th last, said: "The temperance of Austrian women has long been proverbial; but, if the accounts recently published respecting the intemperance of boys and girls in that country are reliable, we fear that Austria will not long continue to sustain its former good character for feminine sobriety. So serious and widespread has intemperance been of recent years among school children that the Vienna school board have, though hitherto ineffectually, been making strenuous efforts for the prohibition of the sale of intoxicating drinks to children. The board has just resolved to invoke the intervention of the government, and a bill is to be laid before parliament during the present session to prohibit the selling of intoxicants to boys and girls under 15 years of age. So alarming is the present state of matters that the appearance of a boy at school in a state of drunkenness is by no means a rare sight."
