My brother-in-law, Mr. Harris, came out with me and we hurried again to the woods to begin a weary march up the lake, where we hoped to be able to board a schooner and sail for the states." After wandering about for five weeks a schooner carried Mr. Ockerman and others to Charlotte, N.Y. He remained in the states until pardoned.
